Instructional Methods

This course is scheduled to be a face-to-face course, which means that we will meet in-person (face to face) every week. Instructional methods will include expression through creative activities, collaborative group activities, group discussions, reflections, and student generated activities. There may be opportunities to learn about strategies to support areas of need from different professionals. The sessions are mediated by speech-language pathology student clinicians who are supervised by an ASHA certified and New York State-licensed speech-language pathologist. Additional Connect members will support the Connect Lab sessions as well. This is an opportunity for students to get input from an interdisciplinary group. 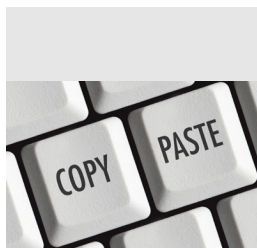

Plagiarism and Artificial Intelligence (AI)



Plagiarism includes, among other things, failure to document the direct words of another or the rephrasing of another's words so as to represent them as one's own; handing in another's paper or project as one's own; or reusing substantial portions of a previously done assignment in response to a current assignment, without first obtaining approval for same from the faculty. It is irrelevant whether the theft was intentional and deliberate or accidental.

Artificial Intelligence is a form of Plagiarism - There has been a significant increase in the popularity and availability of a variety of generative artificial intelligence (AI) tools, including ChatGPT, Sudowrite, Bard, and others. These tools will help shape the future of work, research, and technology, but when used in the wrong way, they can stand in conflict with academic integrity guidelines at Molloy University.

All students have important obligations and expectations on behavior, as detailed in the Student Handbooks, to complete all academic and scholarly activities with fairness and honesty. Our professional students also have the responsibility to uphold the professional and ethical standards found in their respective academic honor codes. Specifically, students are not to use "unauthorized assistance in the laboratory, on fieldwork, in scholarship, or on a course assignment" unless such assistance has been authorized specifically by the course faculty member. In addition, students are not to submit their work without acknowledging any word-for-word use and/or paraphrasing" of writing, ideas, or other work that is not your own.

To maintain a culture of integrity and respect, these generative AI tools should not be used in the completion of course assignments unless a faculty member for a given course specifically authorizes their use. Some faculty may approve of using generative AI tools in the academic setting for specific goals. However, these tools should be used only with the explicit and clear permission of each individual faculty, and then only in the ways allowed by the faculty."

Ally for Canvas



You can now download your course materials in different formats that fit your device, need, and learning preference. Click the download icon next to your course files and select "Alternative Formats" from the dropdown menu. Then select your preferred format. The file may take a few minutes to download, so continue with your work while you wait. The quality of the alternative formats can vary based on the original file, so if something looks out of place, consult the original file. Depending on the type of file, you will see the following options:

- An OCR'd PDF improves the quality of scanned PDFs
- A Tagged PDF for Word and PowerPoint documents or for improved navigation with screen readers
- An HTML version will be simple and responsive to mobile devices with zoom-in capabilities
- An ePub version for use with ePub readers that allows for font customization, contrast adjustment, and annotation/highlighting
- An Electronic Braille version for your Refreshable Braille Display
